

What is the Clothesline Project?

The Clothesline Project is a visual display that bears witness to violence against women. A clothesline is hung with shirts that have been decorated to represent a particular woman's experience, by the survivor herself or by someone who cares about her.

The original Clothesline Project began in 1990 in Hyannis, Massachusetts and since that time have occurred in communities all across the world.

The purpose of the project is four-fold:

- ◆ To bear witness to the survivors as well as the victims of the war against women.
- ◆ To help with the healing process for people who have lost a loved one or are survivors of this violence.
- ◆ To educate, document, and raise society's awareness of the extent of the problem of violence against women.
- ◆ To provide a nationwide network of support, encouragement and information for other communities starting their own Clothesline Projects.

Some Facts About Violence Against Women:

- ◆ One out of every three women will be a victim of violence in her lifetime .
- ◆ One to two women are murdered by a partner or ex-partner in Canada every week.
- ◆ In Canada, an act of male violence against women occurs every six minutes.
- ◆ Each year, women's shelters take in between 90 000 to 100 000 women who have experienced violence.
- ◆ In Quesnel, our transition house shelters over 200 women annually.
- ◆ The Women's Resource Centre serves approximately 2,000 women annually.
